

Thanksgiving Hazards

The holiday season is upon us. Pat yourself on the back for making it through the first holiday, Halloween, without having any candy related problems with your pets! The next holiday hurdle is Thanksgiving. Your pets are likely to be in a frenzy from the wonderful fragrant smells permeating your home. While it is tempting to want to share this special meal with them, please remember how dangerous this meal or any dietary change can be.

To help you have a more relaxing, worry free Thanksgiving, we've put together some tips for a pet friendly holiday.



Guests If you are having guests over, remember to create a safe, comfortable place for your pet to escape. Check to make sure they have their ID tags and make sure to microchip them in the event that they escape.

Decorations Keep out of reach of playful pets as they can be dangerous or even fatal.

Plants Many holiday and everyday plants can be toxic to our pets. Check petpoisonhelpline.com for a list of the top 10 ones.

Garbage Even the most trained pets might be tempted to counter surf or root through the trash. Safely dispose of leftovers right away to prevent illness or obstruction.

Rich Dishes Many of our holiday dishes are laced with sodium and high fat content. Pets who consume these may develop vomiting and diarrhea and/or inflammation of the pancreas which could be life threatening.

Chocolate Can be fatal to your dog. Rapid breathing and hyperactivity are signs of bad reaction to chocolate.

Turkey skin Can be difficult to digest, cause vomiting and diarrhea and in some cases, pancreatitis.

Bones Bones can be brittle and can lodge in the esophagus, or cause an irritation of his or her stomach or intestines.

Foil/plastic wrap Loaded with tempting smells and flavor, pets can be eager to consume. Unfortunately, swallowing foil, string, wax paper or plastic wraps can cause an intestinal obstruction.

Travel tips for Thanksgiving

If you will be staying with friends, remember to be considerate and find out in advance if pets are welcome. Contact airlines in advance to find out what their requirements are. Call ahead to find pet friendly hotels, motels, parks and campgrounds. Most states and foreign countries require pet health certificates from your vet. This can take days, weeks or months to prepare depending on destination. Properly identify your pet with a current ID tag and microchip which can be searched nationwide. Signs that your pet may be sick

Watch for signs that something is wrong. Following a turkey dinner, it may take up to one week before symptoms are evident. Things to watch for are:

- depression
- loss of appetite
- diarrhea
- vomiting
- excessive salivating
- lethargy
- swollen stomach
- rapid pulse
- retching
- weakness
- bloat (when the stomach dilates and rotates – a fatal condition if not treated immediately).



Call your vet immediately if you see any of these symptoms.
